

Owen Gleeson Manawatu stalwart obituary

Manawatū rugby is reeling from the loss of another well-respected elder, after the death of 87-year-old Owen Gleeson at the weekend.

Gleeson was regarded as the elder statesman of Manawatū rugby after a long and storied career as a player, coach, president and life member of the Manwatū Rugby Union.

Union chairman Tim Myers said the rugby community had lost another legend, just a week after the sudden death of former All Black Sam Strahan.

Both men were staunch supporters of Manawatū rugby, who made great contributions to the sport. "Like Sam, Owen was a true gentleman who will be missed by all who came into contact with him. Our thoughts are with his family," Myers said.

Gleeson started his career as a flanker for the Feilding and Marist

Gleeson was part of the New Zealand Kayforce rugby team, drawn from those serving in the Korean War, that toured Japan in 1953.

After returning home, he played 24 games for Manawatū between 1954 and 1957.

selector and coach left a big mark on the team.

Akers said he always thought Gleeson deserved to share the credit with his successor for the province's famous Ranfurly Shield win in 1976.

The match against Auckland was Manawatū's 13th challenge for the shield and its first win. Coincidently, Manawatū would fend off 13 challenges before losing the shield in 1978.

Akers said it was Gleeson who systematically built and recruited a talented pool of younger players, largely from among Massey University students. Players such as Doug Rollerston and winger Hugh Blair went on to play a big part in the team's shield success.

After his coaching days, Gleeson continued to contribute to the Manawatū union, including a stint as president.

"He was very well respected and a top bloke. He was regarded as the elder statesman of Manawatū rugby," Akers said.

"Losing Sam Strahan was a big blow and now we've lost Owen too."

Both men were always around to offer advice to the younger generations and tried to make every game despite their advancing years. Although, Gleeson's declining health meant he couldn't get to as many as he'd of liked in later years, Akers said.



Chris Luoni 1965-69 -Industry loses great contributor

Chris Luoni, one of the driving forces behind the establishment of the New Zealand Racing Hall of Fame and a past chairman has passed away in Hamilton overnight after a battle with illness.

Luoni, an accountant by profession, had been an avid racing fan since his teenage years following the fortunes of his father George's high-class racehorse of the 1970s, Happy Union.

He experienced success as a breeder and owner with horses such as stakes winners Ma Danseuse and Oliverdance, and he also raced Group Two winner Balrani.

Luoni combined his skills as an accountant and passion for racing and breeding and framed many of the current rules in place for the racing industry, specialising in breeding and GST areas, while also consulting to the Australian racing industry on those areas.

"Chris was the instigator of the Hall Of Fame," long-time friend and past Hall Of Fame chairman Gerald Fell said. "Without his enthusiasm, it wouldn't have got off the ground.

"He had been to the Racing Hall Of Fame dinner in Adelaide and suggested the idea, and between us we founded it.

"For many years, he thumped the table about claiming GST, which we now get in New Zealand, if you are registered for racing.

"He also helped the Australians when they brought in GST too.

"I had the greatest respect for Chris. He was passionate about the racing and breeding industry and was a great contributor."

Luoni is survived by wife Rosanna, who is originally from Canada, while daughter Michelle is the Executive Officer for the New Zealand Racing Hall of Fame.



John Kennedy Good leader of St Vincent de Paul Social Justice Outreach for extending commitment to environment

For the first time, the Society of St Vincent de Paul has included a commitment to caring for the environment as an integral part of its strategic plan for the next five years.

Caring for the planet is an essential part of living the Gospel today, said John Kennedy-Good, leader of the society's social justice outreach.

"Vincentians are committed to living sustainably and responding to the challenges outlined in Pope Francis's encyclical, Laudato Si', On Care for Our Common Home. In the words of the Pope: 'Living our vocation to be protectors of God's handiwork is essential to a life of virtue; it is not an optional or secondary aspect of our Christian experience.'"

Mr Kennedy-Good said the society will be asking young Vinnies to take the lead in developing a strategy for practical action in living sustainably and caring for the environment. Conference members of the society will be invited to engage with that strategy.

."We will be encouraging all conference members to reflect on the Pope's message in Laudato Si' and to discuss ways they can respond as conferences and as individuals." Mr Kennedy-Good said the society is well-placed to be an authentic voice advocating against wastefulness in New Zealand's consumerist society

"We are striving to be a leader in recycling second-hand goods through our extensive network of shops. We also want to reduce waste by improving sorting methods, expanding recycling opportunities and educating donors."

Respect for the environment sits alongside respect for people in the society's thinking, Mr Kennedy-Good said.

"We have to find the commitment and courage to act in this area, just as we do to be close to those who are vulnerable and lonely. We must move beyond words and take action to reduce our carbon footprint and live sustainably.
